# Alumni Spotlight *Fall 2024*Jessica Wolverton AA, AAS

Alum 2015 & 2016

Jessica Wolverton, a North West Rankin graduate (2012) and Brandon native, discovered her mother had cancer right out of high school, which delayed her immediate college plans. She was researching nursing school programs when she came across the Surgical Technology program at Holmes Community College.

Wolverton was intrigued that the surgical technology program was only a 12-month program compared to the longer nursing school programs she was researching, so she applied. It was not long before she found out she had been accepted into the program.

"I am forever grateful for the positive impact the program had on my life and that I could go to school then come back home to help my mom during a tough time in our family's lives," Wolverton said.

Earning both an AA and AAS, Wolverton immediately entered the workforce. Her first job was in the St. Dominic's operating room. It was there that she honed her skills over the next three years.

"I loved the action in the surgery world," Wolverton said. "The surgical tech program taught me how to be independent, responsible and how to take care of patients on a different level."

Qualified graduates may apply to the National Board of Surgical Technology and Surgical Assisting (NBSTSA) to take the Surgical

Technology and Surgical Assisting (NBSTSA) to take the Surgical Technologist Certifying Examination to become a Certified Surgical Technologist.

"Shea Coleman, our Surgical Technologist instructor, gave us a good idea of what the program was about," Wolverton said.

The Holmes Surgical Technology program's mission is to produce surgical technologists to meet the needs of hospitals and other health facilities in the nine-county region as well as surrounding


counties. The program provides education in the applied roles of all aspects of surgical technology, including the role of second assistant and circulator, to both traditional and non-traditional students to serve as a member of the surgical team to assist in delivering patient care and to assume appropriate responsibilities before, during and after surgery.

"The most applicable information I took away from the Holmes program was the basics and soaking up as much of the hands-on experience in the clinical setting," Wolverton said.

Since 2020, Wolverton has been working with Dr. William North at Runnels and North Outpatients Plastic Surgery Center. Dr. North, MD, FACS brings the latest techniques and unparalleled experience from the prestigious University of Kentucky Albert B. Chandler Hospital in Lexington. He focuses on providing the latest in surgical and non-surgical techniques for cosmetic procedures of the breast, body and face, in addition to providing general plastic surgical services for breast reconstruction after mastectomy, skin reduction after massive weight loss and facial reconstruction after cancer removal.

"Wolverton has been working alongside me for four years now," Dr. North said. "She was able to use the foundation of surgical procedures and knowledge that she received at Holmes and apply it to clinical use. It is obvious that her success is a combination of a good educational background and her own willingness to succeed at a high level. She cares about succeeding and providing quality assistance in both the pre-operative period, the surgery itself and the post-operative time period. In healthcare, we all have to go to school to learn our trade and use that background to perfect our craft through our own drive."

Wolverton resides in Brandon and is married to Tanner. They have one son (Bodie) together and their second arriving in the fall.



## Alumnus of the Year: CAROLYN THOMAS

Holmes Community College will honor Carolyn Burrell Thomas of Goodman as the 2024 Alumna of the Year, which is among one of the college's highest alumni honors. Thomas has served on the Holmes Development Foundation Board of Governors.

Thomas was a high school graduate of Holmes Agricultural High School and continued on to complete her AAS in general business in 1953 from Holmes Junior College.

After Holmes, her first job was working part-time at Holmes County Bank. Her first full-time job was for a cotton buyer.

Thomas found her fit with the United States Postal Service. She served for 30 years; 14 of those years she served as postmaster in Goodman.

Since Thomas had three boys (George, Ronnie and Rickie), she started the Cub Scout group in Goodman and served as Den Mother for many years. She also visited most of the schools in Holmes County encouraging children to collect stamps, a Merit Badge requirement for the Boy Scouts.



Among other civic activities, Thomas taught the kindergarten Sunday school class at the Goodman United Methodist Church for 27 years, also serving as Chairman of the Board for the church. She was the Holmes County Cancer Crusade Chairman for many years and her dedication to volunteer work placed her on the State Board for that organization.

Thomas has been a lifelong resident of Goodman. She is preceded in death by her husband George Allen Thomas, Sr. and her son Ronald (Ronnie) Thomas. Her two living sons George and Rickie remain close to their mother. She is also surrounded by five grandchildren and eight great grandchildren.

Dr. Autumn M. Barron (15), native of Possumneck, will be recognized as the 2024 Young Alumna of the Year for Holmes Community College during the Homecoming festivities on Oct. 31.

Dr. Barron graduated from Kosciusko High School before coming to Holmes. While at Holmes, she excelled and was very involved, serving as a Holmes Ambassador, Dazzler, and MOSAIC member. In addition, she was voted Freshman Homecoming Maid and was on the Spirit Team that helped with sports recruitment.

"I loved my time at Holmes," Dr. Barron said.

After her time at Holmes, Dr. Barron attended the University of Mississippi where she earned a Bachelor of Communication Sciences and Disorders. Some of the awards and achievements received while attending Ole Miss were the Dean's Honor Roll and Who's Who. She was also involved with Alpha Kappa Alpha Incorporated, Associated Student Body, the Black Student Union, and served as a Football Recruiter at the University of Mississippi.

In 2023, Dr. Barron earned a Doctorate of Audiology from the University of Memphis. She was a recipient of the Marion Hammett Scholarship (2022), selected for the Student Advocate of the Year Award (2023) and co-author of "Audiologists' attitudes and practice toward referring for psychosocial intervention with cochlear implant patients."

Currently, Dr. Barron serves as a clinical audiologist at the Jackson Ear Clinic in Flowood. On a daily basis, she helps diagnose, manage, and treat the hearing of her patients. Dr. Barron also counsels patients who are losing their hearing and advises on prevention loss programs, along with assisting patients with

the management of ringing in their ear (tinnitum). The workforce training has provided Dr. Barron with an expertise in programing hearing aids, inserting ear implants and assessing listening devices.

Dr. Barron resides in Kosciusko with her husband, Kenneth Barron II, who is also a Holmes alumnus. They have one child Kenneth Barron III (5).



### Veteran of the Year: DAVIS A. RICHARDS, III

Davis A. Richards III will be recognized for his service in the United States Navy Reserve at Holmes Community College homecoming on Oct. 31 in Goodman.
